Scope and Content

Katherine Lindsay was the founder of the first Seventh-day Adventist school of nursing. Born September 11, 1842 in Madison Wisconsin, she was the daughter of Scottish immigrants. Inspired by the story of Florence Nightingale, Lindsay trained as a nurse in an institution in New Jersey, before attending college for six years and then moving to Ann Arbor, Michigan where she graduated in 1875 at the head of her class with the first group of women to complete medical training from the University of Michigan Medical College. During her long career, "Dr. Kate" worked at sanitariums in Battle Creek, Michigan; Cape Town, South Africa; and Boulder, Colorado, serving on the medical staffs, teaching in nursing programs, and working as a medical consultant.

This collection contains a Bible which belonged to Lindsay.

The arrangement of the collection has been done by the Union College Library Heritage Room.
